

UCKED SNUGLY INTO BRITISH COLUMBIA'S SOUTH-CENTRAL INTERIOR IS A REGION PROFUSE with rugged natural beauty. It whispers to the adventurous, the thrill-seeking and fun-loving: "Come, play." • This is B.C. Ski Country, a compendium of four award-winning ski resorts in the Thompson-Okanagan, a region wedged between the Coastal Mountains to the west and the Selkirk and Monashee Mountain Ranges to the east. It comprises striking plateaus, highlands, mountains, rivers and lakes.

The close geographical proximity of the four resorts - Apex, Big White, Silver Star and Sun Peaks – creates a unique winter touring opportunity. They're well within easy driving distance of one another, and approximately a half day's drive from Vancouver and Seattle. Regional air service and international flights via Kelowna and Kamloops bring visitors from all corners.

Those yearning for exceptional conditions amidst a winter wonderland find it in B.C. Ski Country. The area's dry mild climate produces fluffy powder for nearly half the year, from late November to mid-April.

All four resorts are world-class, with pristine glades and glens to quicken the pulse, picturesque villages that are fairy-tale-perfect and the ultimate in convenience and access

- with ski-in/ski-out accommodations.

Truly a winter playground, B.C. Ski Country caters to all ages and interests. From dawn till après ski and beyond, the thrills, chills and spills are endless. Groomed runs, tubing, tobogganing, sled rides and snowmobiling give families unlimited choice, while heli-skiing, gulleys and serious pipe action give fearless skiers and boarders the rides of their lives.

Besides fully serviced mountainside villages, all four resorts neighbour major towns, offering visitors a multitude of diversions. Recreational opportunities abound, as do arts and culture. Culinary offerings, boutique shopping and nightlife are abundant, while accommodations are plentiful, suiting all budgets.

Come, play. B.C. Ski Country awaits.



BRITISH COLUMBIA'S FOUR MAJOR HIGHWAYS and two of its rivers converge at the hub of B.C.'s Adventure Destination - Kamloops. This lively city is home to 82,000 residents and attracts visitors from every corner of the globe. A mere 53 kilometres from the city centre, Sun Peaks Resort soars nearly 3,000 vertical feet from the ski-in/ski-out village. The award-winning resort has the second largest skiable area in B.C. and is rated as one of Canada's finest, boasting award-winning trail and village design, abundant sunshine and lots of the dry fluffy white stuff.

The mountain's terrain is enviable, with three distinct mountain faces to conquer. The newest addition, Morrisey Mountain, offers mostly intermediate runs while Tod Mountain's open bowls are close to heaven; groomed cruising runs appease novices and intermediates on Sundance Mountain. Visitors can even try to keep pace with Canada's past Olympic gold medallist Nancy Greene Raine (Sun Peak's ski director).

And Sun Peaks is crazy for kids. For starters, they ski free if they're five or younger. Tots and teens alike will enjoy the Kids Adventure Park, featuring kid-sized snowmobiles, a toboggan course and tube hill.


Adults and families can have non-stop fun, too. Mush your own team of huskies on a dogsled expedition, tour the backcountry by snowcat, snowshoes or snowmobile. Slide along 40 km of groomed cross-country ski tracks. Ice skate on a full-sized arena; swim, soak or exercise at the Sports Centre. And if you're feeling a bit rusty on the slopes, brush up on boarding, telemarking or skiing techniques at the Snow Sport School.


Après ski, the adventures continue. Tuck into international cuisine at any one of the 18 restaurants, pubs and cafés, followed by a leisurely stroll through the intimate slopeside village in search of souvenirs, clothing, gear upgrades or the basics like groceries and spirits.

Ski-in/ski-out accommodations in the village are palatable for all budgets. Choose from hotels, condos, chalets, B&Bs and RV facilities.

Craving an urban experience? Head back into Kamloops, a first-class city with plentiful offerings. Here, the arts scene is thriving: The culturally inclined can take in stage performances, orchestral evenings, dinnertheatre revues, galleries and museums. Or check out "Wildlights" - the largest winter light display in B.C.'s interior at the Kamloops Wildlife Park December 5 to January 4 (except Christmas Day).

Recognized as the Tournament Capital of Canada, Kamloops hosts sporting events every weekend, from hockey games to swim

meets. January 6 through 11, 2004, will see the Canada Cup of Curling in Kamloops. The hills around Kamloops are ideal for wintertime pursuits. Snowmobiling, crosscountry and backcountry skiing, and so much more - your adventure is as close as the nearest snowflake.



A MERE 110 KM SOUTH OF KAMLOOPS, AND sitting halfway between Calgary and Vancouver, is a city aplomb with genuine hospitality, a striking landscape and activities galore. Lovely parks, wellmaintained trails and beaches appeal to nature lovers year-round, while on the outskirts of Vernon, Silver Star Mountain Resort is the city's pinnacle attraction - recently named Best Small Resort in North America (U.K.'s 2003 Golden Awards).

Basking within a microclimate of abundant sunshine, this world-class ski mountain churns

out some of the country's deepest powder. Skiers can explore well-groomed terrain over two faces. Vance Creek: friendly and fun for families and novices. And Putnam Creek bowl: fast and formidable. Approximately half the resort's runs are intermediate, and riders can hit the half pipe and terrain park for some serious air. Whether expert or beginner, the professionally guided Ski and




programs for all levels and ages. Nordic

trail systems meander 55 km through thick forest – often a training site for Olympic teams - and have trackside day lodges and warming huts. Besides skiing and boarding, Silver Star

offers a multitude of wintertime fun. Take a professionally guided snowmobile tour, or hit maximum velocity at Tube Town, Western Canada's steepest tube park. Join an impromptu hockey game or practice figure eights on the skating pond. Strap on snow-

The Victorian-inspired village charms visitors with its ornate architecture, vibrantly painted houses and warm atmosphere. By night, it's a twinkling wintry wonderland. Bundle up aboard a horse-drawn sleigh tour for a jingle round town. Then hunker down with some great grub and brewskies at any number of establishments. Visitors can choose from over 3,200 beds on-mountain, at eight hotels and more than 100 vacation homes.

The City of Vernon also embraces the frosty season with an annual Light Up festival in November. The entire downtown is transformed into a wintry fairy tale, complete with hot goodies, horse-drawn carriage rides, children's carousel and more holiday fun. And the highlight of seasonal celebrations is Vernon's annual Winter Carnival. This 10-day extravaganza hosts events like the 48-hour B.C. Snow Sculpture Competition (hosted at Silver Star Resort), Hot Air Balloon Fiesta, parade, musical attractions, sporting events and more. This carnival is the largest of its kind in Western Canada (February 6-15, 2004).

Vernon prides itself on artistic and cultural endeavours. Larger-than-life historic murals around town add colour, and chronicle Vernon's past. Theatres, arts centre and a multiplex host first-rate concerts and hockey tournaments. Other indoor venues keep kids and families hopping. Hit the Science Centre, Nature Centre or recreation complex. The historic O'Keefe Ranch hosts a very special Victorian Christmas. And what of golf? With Vernon's mild climate, you can ski by morning, and be on the greens mid-afternoon. And what greens . . . Predator Ridge has been ranked in the top three golf resorts in the country.

Accommodations in town range from cozy B&Bs to chalets, hotels and lodges. Shopping opportunities cater to all tastes and

Set amidst the spectacular Monashee Mountains, and a 45-minute drive from Kelowna, Big White recently received the distinction of Best Family Resort in North America, as rated in the Good Ski Guide. The resort encompasses 2,800 hectares and receives a generous 7.2 metres of snow annually. Numerous powder bowls and treed glades keep the adrenalin going for weeks. At the base of the resort's gondola, the Happy Valley Adventure Centre is the catch-all for tube-ride action, world-Kelowna, population 100,000. This haven renowned snowmobiling, ice skating,
